

SHIPS/MADDOX DECK LOGS

I have received inquiries from people who served aboard the Maddox in the 60's and are now suffering from illness that they consider to be from Agent Orange. Their benefits are being denied by the VA as we know; the Maddox is not on the list of ships they claim was exposed to the chemical. The deck logs are available by writing to the National Archives. Tell them the dates or months that you want the deck logs for; they will send a form back to you with the estimated cost. The copying fee is .80 a page, and there could be as many as 50 pages per month. It may take up to 90 days to receive the logs once you send back the form. If you or if you hear of someone who needs help, the deck logs of the Maddox are available at this address:

USS MADDOX ASSOCIATION REUNION 2013 MOBILE, AL

The Maddox enjoyed another reunion in 2013, this time in Mobile, AL. Of course the highlight of the reunion was getting to see everyone who has become part of the Maddox family. There is always much laughter and great story telling when everyone gets together. The tour this year was to the National Naval Aviation Museum in Pensacola, FL. While touring around in the museum we were also able to watch a Chief Petty Officer Pinning Ceremony. The Museum also had an Art Gallery where we found the picture below. It depicts the Turner Joy and the hull of another ship on the night of Aug. 4, 1964. If you look closely at the 2nd picture you see that it is the Maddox, or at least the bow of it.





The inscription under the portrait reads:

During night action in the Tonkin Gulf on 4 August 1964, a 5inch gun on board Turner Joy (DD951) flashes as the destroyer fires upon attacking North Vietnamese torpedo boats. The battle, lasting some 2 1/2 hours and coming on the heels of attacks against Maddox to nights earlier, prompted retaliatory carrier strikes against North Vietnam and marked the escalation of American involvement in Vietnam.

Many of the attendees also visited the USS Alabama which sits at Battleship Memorial Park in Mobile along with the USS Drum, a submarine. The Alabama is a real treat for any sailor as you can go anywhere on her, top to bottom. You can man the gun turrets, get locked in the brig or day dream in the fire room. It was not

hard to find the "Maddox Men" as they would group together to tell stories of their jobs on the Maddox as compared to the Alabama.
