#### Life Aboard Maddox in 1968

In our last newsletter we left off just as the Maddox arrived in Subic Bay on 27 July.

Maddox stayed in Subic for 5 days to install a new fire pump & to make other needed repairs. MMCS Fredrick Hoy, MM1 Roy Montgomery & FA Joseph MCC Haley worked long hours with personnel from the ship Repair Facility in Subic to install the pump. BM1 Robert Crosley had his work cut out for him trying to catch up with the rust caused by the storm. It was the rainy season in Subic. You could expect it to rain about every 15-20 min. making painting of the ship almost impossible.

I was not all work during our stay. The Naval Base has large recreation facilities where almost any hobby from swimming to slot car racing can be enjoyed. Clubs are provided where the men can relax. There are several Navy Exchanges available where the men can purchase foreign merchandise at reasonable prices. Each of those places was well patronized by Maddox sailors.

We left Subic on 1 Aug. in a rain squall enroute to rendezvous with the aircraft carrier USS Constellation (CVS-64) to escort her to the Tonkin Gulf & our station in Seventh Fleet operations. On 3 Aug., we left the Constellation & joined the carrier Intrepid (CVS-11). The Intrepid is home ported in Norfolk & is deployed to the Seventh Fleet for a tour of duty as attack carrier. While in company with the carriers we had the opportunity to observe carrier flight operations. It is a very impressive sight to watch the planes as they are hurled into the sky & scream around the horizon in close formation before slamming down on the deck of the carrier as they land.

Late on the evening of 3 Aug, we received a message changing our schedule & assigning us & the USS Boston (CAG-1), a heavy cruiser, as a task unit assigned to Operation Sea Dragon. Operation Sea Dragon is assigned the mission of disruption of North Vietnamese lines of supply to South Vietnam through the destruction of waterborne logistics craft (WBLC) & costal roads & bridges in North Vietnam. This assignment was what we had

been trained for & one for which we are well equipped. Our sixfive inch guns provide us with more fire power than the majority of destroyers & make us best suited for the task at hand.

We rendezvoused with USS Boston late on the afternoon of 4 Aug. to receive some materials from them & to discuss the operation ahead. Our primary responsibility is firing suppression fire at coastal gun emplacements to discourage their firing at us while we are conducting a mission. Boston, with her eight inch guns, is able to shoot far inland at targets while we shoot at the gun emplacements along the coast. We operate so that we approach the coast no closer than is necessary to perform our mission so that there is a minimum of danger of exposing ourselves to fire from the guns which line the coast of North Vietnam. Yet sometimes we must go close to do our mission.

By now, most of you have heard about the two "shoot-out" we had either through the news or through letters from your loved ones aboard Maddox. On both of these occasions, we necessarily closed the coast more than we normally would to do our mission. The first occurred on 8 Aug., while Boston was firing at some WBLC's far up a river, several coastal gun emplacements opened fire. Most of the firing was directed toward Boston. The closest shot to us was about one half mile away. Never the less, it still caused guite a bit of excitement. Within seconds after the coastal guns opened fire, Maddox five inch guns, under the control of director officer, LTJG Dan Miccia, opened fire on the coastal guns. The accuracy of our fire was remarkable in the heat of the moment. At least one large secondary explosion at the coastal gun emplacement & possibly several others can be attributed to Maddox fire. No damage was received by either Boston or Maddox

The second one occurred on 11 Aug. at about 0900. We were just finishing a mission when several coastal gun emplacements opened fire on us. We maneuvered to avoid the fall of the North Vietnamese shells which were hitting all around us. The closest round fell about 10 feet off the port bow & splashed water over the bridge. We estimated more than 200 rounds were fired at us. Once again, our guns answered the North Vietnamese fire. I don't know what damage we inflicted upon them. We escaped

without damage. After it was over, a number of the crew members recovered pieces of shrapnel from North Vietnamese shells lying on the decks.

I cannot put into words the praise I have for each crew member aboard during these actions. Each man aboard performed as a veteran. I cannot single out any particular man to praise without shorting others. The Engineers gave us the speed & the gun crews fought back with all they had. They are truly men who have been tested in the field of battle & won. I am truly fortunate to be associated with this crew & I am proud to go anywhere with them at anytime.

Everything since the 11 Aug. firing has been quiet. We spent most of 12 & 13 Aug. evading a typhoon & in replenishing stores & fuel. We have another three days to go on Sea Dragon before we are relieved to proceed to our next assignment.

I hope this letter has provided each of you with an insight into the part your loved ones are playing aboard Maddox & the job Maddox is doing in the Vietnam conflict. Our efforts, when combined with those of others will help to end this war soon & stop the spread of Communism in Southeast Asia & the Free World. I regret that I've not been able to mention each man aboard by name but their efforts have not gone unnoticed. You can be justly proud of them, as I am, for a job well done. They are superb. Until my next letter, I remain

Thank you for putting together the website detailing the USS Maddox. Attached is a picture that was among the things my grandfather, Lawrence Kreissler, left me. It says on the back "Charlie Richards - friend lost in the war". It is a picture of Charlie Richards & Margaret (Linn) Kreissler in front of the WWI memorial in Kansas City, MO.


Lawrence & Charlie were from the small town of Appleton City, MO. Charlie was one of the 210 men that lost their life with the sinking of the USS Maddox.

Another WWII veteran from Appleton City, Clyde Thomas, served with the 1st infantry, 32nd field artillery as a medic. I was told that while he was in North Africa he witnessed the sinking of a destroyer....which he later found out was the USS Maddox and that Charlie was lost.

Charlie Richards, Navy; Lawrence Kreissler, Army-Air Force; Clyde Thomas, Army. They are three of the roughly 350 men and women from this town of 1,100 that served during WWII.

## **Stars & Stripes Honor Flight**



The Stars & Stripes Honor Flights in the southeastern portion of WI. has been celebrating their success of sending all WWII veterans, who were on their waiting list to Washington D.C. to visit their Memorial there. You may have an Honor Flight program in your area and it is a great way to honor WWII Veterans. These veterans along with a chaperone are flown to D.C. where they visit the WWII Memorial, Iwo Jima Memorial, Arlington Cemetery, along with Korean War, Viet Nam, Lincoln and several other memorials as time permits. One of the most popular events of the trip is the "mail call" on the plane coming home where each veteran receives mail from family, friends, and even school children they don't know. Once they arrive back at Mitchell Field in Milwaukee they are greeted by thousands of people who come out to give them a hero's welcome. It is an amazing thing to watch and see the joy on the faces of these guys. Now that the waiting list is small and there is room on the planes, the Honor Flight will be taking Korean War and terminally ill veterans from other conflicts to Washington D.C. to visit their memorials.

Stars & Stripes Honor Flight, Inc. has also accomplished another great event with the filming of Field of Honor. This is a documentary about these Honor Flights and had its movie premier at Milwaukee's baseball stadium, Miller Park in Aug. of 2012. This premier set a World Record for a premier by having 28,442 attendees. Field of Honor captures stories and the spirit of WWII veterans. It is out on DVD or you can search for it in your browser.

## **DIVINE ASSISTANCE**

When, where and how does "Divine Assistance" come to us? In an everyday existence of a 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. routine, unless we are stopped in our tracks by some event, this thought seldom crosses our mind or our heart

However, within all of our lives, there are those crisis moments when we are faced with the need for something greater than that which comes from pure human knowledge, strength or power. Today, Sunday, April 21", these thoughts become profound due to the events of the last few days while watching the news coverage of the "Boston" marathon tragedy, the "West, Texas" explosion, and so many other "pain in the heart" events. Without diminishing the horribleness of those on the National News, I am drawn to that which is happening to people right around me (and around you) -- within families, and within the complex close relationships we have with friends and neighbors. The myriad interactions of body, mind and soul will be deeply touched and felt -- and the sharing of all that with those immediately around them. Yes, true friends and our families help, and we couldn't do without them -- but in the depths of those silent moments, something (a greater power) has to come from somewhere.

But, where can that extra come from? **Divine Assistance!** In my life and in my mind, there can be nothing else to offer as a reason

of where that additional strength comes from. Whether we are mindful or consciously aware of that as being the truth, it exists.
